Master Chuang has extensive coaching experience at the international level. As one of the preeminent coaches in the US, he was appointed Head Coach of the US National Taekwondo Poomsae Team in 2014 and continues to serve in that role. Chuang was on the coaching staff of the US National Poomsae Team at the World Poomsae Championships in Bali, Indonesia (2013), Aguascalientes, Mexico (2014), and served as head coach at the World Poomsae Championships in Lima, Peru (2016), where he lead the team to an historic 3rd place finish in the world. He also served as head coach for Team USA at the Pan American Poomsae Championships in 2015 and 2016.

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Chuang also was head coach of the US National Collegiate Taekwondo team in 2010 and 2013. Chuang was a US collegiate sparring coach on that team from 2008-2010 and 2013-2015 and was a US collegiate poomsae coach from 2009-2011 and 2013-2015. He coached at the World University Games in Belgrade, Serbia (2009), Shenzhen, China (2011), and Gwangju, Korea (2015), and at the World University Taekwondo Championships in Belgrade, Serbia (2008), Vigo, Spain (2010), and Hohhot, China (2014).

Master Chuang served as a sparring coach at the 2016 Olympic Test Event in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, coaching his US athlete, Carissa Fu. In the past he also coached 2005 World Taekwondo Championships in Madrid, Spain for Trinidad and Tobago, where he had the pleasure of coaching his friend and training partner, Olympian Chinedum Osuji, and was a trainer for the Trinidad and Tobago team at the 2007 Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Chuang is one of the coaches t.Bos, a group of collegiate, national and international level competitors from various schools in the Boston area who have been training together since 2001, including national and international champions.

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Master Chuang works hard to organize competitions and to promote Taekwondo at the national and regional levels. He serves as the Secretary General of the National Collegiate Taekwondo Association. He was tournament director of the National Collegiate Taekwondo Championships and also runs an annual collegiate tournament at MIT. Chuang also serves as director of the Eastern Collegiate Taekwondo Conference, a league of over 500 students from Taekwondo clubs at over 25 colleges and universities which compete in a circuit of 5 tournaments per year.

Chuang earned his bachelors and masters degrees in engineering from Cornell University and currently works full time as an engineering manager.
